Bicchieri, C. (2006). *The Grammar of Society. The nature and dynamics of social norms*. Cambridge: Cambridge University Press.

This is a comprehensive study of the changing norms in human relations as functions of social psychology, evolutionary game theory and the psychological dispositions of the individual. For more advanced students.

Buss, D. M. (1994). The Evolution of Desire: Strategies of human mating. New York: Basic Books.

This is a biological, evolutionary-based synthesis of elements including physical attraction, infidelity and sexual orientation into a unified theory of mating behaviour.
